<p>Entity; Topic Mike Carney; <i>Science Building Update</i></p>	<p>Questions Q – Sen. Kelly: What ADA requirements are there, like elevators? A: One main bank of elevators (2), also a service elevator. Follow up: Any other special considerations for accessibility? A: Every lab is ADA compliant.</p> <p>Q – Sen. Strojinc: Will the elevator go to the sixth floor? A: Yes</p> <p>Q – Sen. Bolog: Is there a need for more tools with similar departments being near each other? A: No. That is the reason for having the departments in neighborhoods, we will not need to duplicate equipment because they will be able to share it.</p>
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Q – Sen. De Ruyter: Are the faculty offices in neighborhoods as well? Or separated by department?

A: There are enough offices. The distribution issue is still a topic of discussion.

Q – Sen. Mandli: Some departments like to host social events. Is there space for that? Or will the common area on each floor be used for that?

A: Yes, they are a relatively small size. Not large sizes, only large lecture hall. Will be conference halls and student rooms.

Q – Sen. Bolog: Why was kinesiology not included in the building?

A: Because what they currently have in McPhee currently fits their needs. Could create a disconnect from faculty and staff.

Follow up: Are there plans that would revamp the kins building?

A: There are plans to see what a renovated McPhee could look like. Just on the drawing board, nothing design-wise started. It is a topic of discussion. Probably a 10-year project.

Q – Dir. Johnson: What is the square footage of Phillips vs the new building?

A: This is 320,000 sq ft. It is the single largest most-expensive building ever constructed by the state of Wisconsin. Phillips is 60% the size of the new building.

Q – Dir. Velazquez: Since it can house more students, will it affect enrollment?

A: It can't house more students, aside from Nursing. Building was designed with best practices in mind, so there will be more room in the labs than in Phillips.

Follow up: How do you think it will affect enrollment?

A: Hopefully it will wow more students and have a dramatic positive affect on STEM students.

Q – Sen. Multhauf: Will the Nursing space be a replacement or an addition?

A: Addition. 2nd phase looking closer at Nursing building and renovating it, farther down the road.

Motion to extend by 5 mins; Dir. Velazquez. Seconded by Sen. Lehner. Passes.



	<p>Q – Sen. Garbisch: What will happen to the bird museum? A: It will be there, along with a new planetarium, on the 2nd floor.</p> <p>Q – Dir. Velazquez: What will happen to Phillips? A: It will come tumbling down (in a controlled manner). Current plan is to save the very front, possibly turn in into an event room. Will keep Phillips 007. Preserve some of the history.</p> <p>Q – Dir. Heap: Can you talk more about the spaces for Mayo partnership? A: There will a bio fabrication lab (3d printing). 2nd floor is design lab. Freeform solving problems. 3rd floor for students, faculty and technicians in research projects. 4th floor Mayo will create a surgical and procedural suite. No live work, but simulation space for practice. 5th floor telehealth.</p>
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- There are 3 main entrances
- 6 floors, 6th is mostly maintenance, greenhouse at the top
- Lecture hall, about same size of Phillips 007
 - Not tiered but flat
- Only two actual classrooms, the rest is labs
- Entrance is lobby, two floors
- Cabinets and displayed curated by departments, rotating
- Video screens to announce events, speakers, etc
- Staircase will look like main staircase in Centennial
 - View of Chippewa River
- Every floor will have gathering space or alcoves
- Phillips doesn't allow for different disciplines to interact very much
 - Most science buildings built with departments having their own floors
 - New building mixes disciplines
 - Encourage mingling between people doing similar work
 - Students and faculty + staff benefit
- Departments are now in neighborhoods instead of floors
- Mayo Clinic also has footprint in the building
 - Mayo has 10,000 sq ft, 2,000 ft in each floor
 - Strategically placed between students and faculty locations
- Ready for fall 2027 semester

REPORT: President – Brett Farmer

Good evening everyone!

Last week, I had a fairly busy week with meetings with Chancellor Jim on Monday, the Provost on Tuesday, attended the Finance commission meeting on Thursday and held all of my usual check-ins. I put in *lots* of time all week with Vice President Consiglio writing, signing, and finally sending out nearly 30 letters to legislators from our area as well as all 8 on the Joint Committee on Employment Relations in response to what JCOER has been doing with UW employee Pay Plan recently, and with the support of the resolution that VP Consiglio and I wrote and this body passed unanimously last week, so thank you once again for your input and assistance on that front.

Additionally, I spent a lot of time applying and preparing for grad school, as well as launch a new application for Mascot Coordinator and Parliamentarian on Blugold Connect+. That being said, if you have any interest in applying, you can now find the application on our Blugold Connect+ page or in the email I sent earlier today, and I encourage you to take a look!

This week, our exec team already had the pleasure of the Chancellor's executive team joining us at 5:00pm tonight, where we talked about everything from UW Pay Plan, to IGA's work regarding the state Trans Athlete ban, to our potential new commission and hopes to rewrite the bylaws.

Additionally this week, I am planning on attending some campus events, including IGA's trans athlete open forum and conversation, the Study Abroad office's social event for returned study abroad students, In Conversation with Alok presented by MSS and GSRC, and the Artist Series' presentation of Native Pride Dancers.

Additionally, I'll be attending a facilities assessment review meeting, meeting with Event Services to discuss the charging structure for spaces in Davies and having my regular meeting with Dean Heinselmann.

Tonight, I want to wrap up my report on a bit of a different note. For those of you who are unaware or may not be following campuses across the state, UW-River Falls has had a rough fall semester. They have lost four members of their campus community this fall, three of which have been students. It is an incredibly difficult reminder of how fragile life is and also the often-invisible ties and connection that we all hold as a part of a campus community of nearly 15,000 students, faculty, and staff here at UW-Eau Claire, but also with colleges, universities, and students across the state and country. It is unexplainably important that we all take time to step back and check in on ourselves and everyone around us from time to time. I know I say it at the end of my report each week, but I want to reiterate how important it is, and how sincerely I mean it. College is such a strange time and place in anyone's life, where everything around us seems like it holds so much weight, and like every decision we make could dictate



the rest of our lives. At the same time, it can be so easy to see everything and everyone around us and feel like we are so minute in the grand scheme of things and that nothing really matters, ourselves included at times. All this in subpar housing, with little to no family around us, and connections and communities we are forced to build ourselves. I want to be clear that I have been in that scary, isolating, anxiety-filled state before, and so has every single person in this room and on this campus. part of being a college student—and just being a human—is feeling at times like you are at the very bottom of the pyramid, or sometimes even looking at the pyramid from afar. Without these moments, you will never be able to experience the feeling of being on top of it.

I remember when I joined this body as a scared, naïve, uneducated little freshman, afraid to even look at the microphone sitting in front of me, let alone speak into it to voice my opinion that somebody else was sure to have in the body. I didn't think I needed to be heard. Starting in that seat and in that position is what got me here, chairing this meeting in front of you all. In and out of this body, I beg you all to reflect on the significance of your voice and your life. In this ever-changing, unpredictable world we live in, you need to focus and lean on the folks in your life that make you feel like you're on top of your little pyramid. If you don't have those people in your life, please let me know and let me, and the rest of this group, be those people for you. Please do not ever lose sight of the light in your life, and if you feel your light getting dim, I beg you to let me help you find it or share some of mine. For those who don't know, I lost my roommate freshman year, and I live everyday wishing he could see, just one time, the impact he had on this world, the people around him, and this university. Do not ever underestimate yourself and your place in the world. You are here for so many reasons, and as hard as they might be to find, especially in college, I promise you they are out there. What you are doing and persevering through right now is just part of the journey to discover those reasons. I don't know who needs to hear it, but something I've been telling myself frequently is that there is no inherent purpose in life, but it is up to us to find, determine, and create purpose within our own lives. I care for and respect all of you here so much and will always be here if you ever need anything. Never be afraid to step back every once in a while, to gain some clarity on the purpose you are building for yourself here at UWEC. Q – Sen. Lehner: Why did the Spectator only get 47% of their request?

A: They usually get \$18,000 but they didn't get that last year. They reevaluated their wages, because they only have set hours and get paid \$7.25 per hour. They doubled their ask to raise hourly maximums and student wages between \$10-\$15. We are going to give them more each year, for a more gradual increase. We gave them \$2,000 more to start that incline.

Q – Sen. Lehner: Hypothetically, if you were to grant the total amount for every request, what would seg fees be raised by?

A: \$24.50 increase. One of many seg fees that students pay. If every seg fee increased, tuition could go up by \$3,000.

Q – Sen. Bolog: Would each seg fee go up by \$153?

A: It is going up \$5 per student.

Q – Sen. Mandli: In 30 words or less, why should we support this?

A: After 16 hours and 2 weeks, this is the best the commission could come up with.
