The purpose of this Team Leader Guide is to give you info and resources that will help you in preparing the ground work in forming a motivated, high energy team open to all the learning and inspiration that can come with a service

project. The more a team puts into building their sense of purpose and esprit de corps beforehand the better the experience will be. Many of our volunteer projects involve hard work that requires volunteers to have some grit and persistence. Having said that, those very same challenging conditions encourage volunteers to reach down and find the good will and joy of service that bonds them together and forms lifelong memories and lasting friendships.



When packing for a trip, two old sayings hold true. First, lay out what you want to bring, **then take half of that**. The second, an adage of international journalists and inveterate business travelers, warns to take only as much as you could **carry at a dead run for half a mile**.

In other words, **pack light**. It's amazing how much you think you might need, only to return home and find out that, not only did you not use the

questionable items, but you also didn't unpack half of what you considered indispensable.

Three changes of clothing plus what you wear on the plane is more than enough.

Put everything in a suitcase or backpack, and a daypack. (No oversized suitcases, please)

- Towel
- Flashlight or headlamp
- Batteries
- Raincoat/poncho with hood
- Light jacket or sweatshirt
- Insect repellent
- Water bottle
- Bathing suit
- Personal hygiene items and sunblock,
- Blouses or shirts, long sleeves/**fast drying**, and short sleeves/ colors like brown, green, blue, beige (white attracts bugs)
- Long pants light weight/fast drying & shorts
- Undergarments and socks
- A few various size zip lock plastic bags often come in handy
- Comfortable walking shoes and flip flops
- Shoes and clothing you don't mind getting wet and dirty (for environmental projects)
- Cap or hat (important to protect your head from the sun)
- Camera
- Books
- Any medication you need (labeled w prescriptions if needed)
- Extra money for personal purchases

We encourage you to bring fast drying clothing. (Sweat pants & jeans take forever to dry) Remember, **we are not going to the moon**, **:**) you can pick up any forgotten items along the way.



The tropics are DAMP and hard on electronics. Leave laptops. Bring smart phone.

Arrival Airport

Volunteer teams will be met by their Volunteer Coordinator at the Luis <u>Muñoz Marín International Airport</u>. (No passport needed for US citizens)

Transportation

All transportation from the time we pick you up at the airport until we drop you off at the airport at the end of the project is provided.

Lodging



Volunteers stay in bunkhouse style accommodations at various facilities in the area. Volunteers also stay at AirBNB style accommodations.



Meals



All volunteers are provided breakfast, lunch, dinner throughout the week.

Breakfast is continental style with cereal, bagels, muffins, juice, coffee and fruit.

After you have your breakfast you'll have a chance to make a brown bag lunch. Be sure your team members have water bottles. Volunteers working outside should drink at least a quart of water/

day and more if they're working in hot sweaty conditions. As a team leader make sure you see your team members taking water breaks.





Dinners are prepared by local cooks and are typical Puerto Rican family style meals, rice, beans, vegetables, and beef, chicken, pork or fish always with a salad bar.

Vegetarian options are available at each meal.

Climate



Puerto Rico temperatures are consistently around 80 degrees year round.

Don't be lulled, however, into thinking the sun is not a powerful force down here. Sunburn and dehydration will take the vigor and positive spirit out

of your team if you don't cover up with sunscreen or clothing and drink lots of water.

It's your responsibility to secure any electronics or valuables you choose to bring on the trip.

Health

Puerto Rico has a 911 emergency response system and many urgent care facilities. Please consult the <u>CDC Puerto Rico Travel</u> <u>Info page for health info.</u>

ALL VOLUNTEERS must complete an online <u>Volunteer</u> <u>Agreement</u> prior to starting the Puerto Rico project.
