
Promoting a healthy and safe environment for residents, visitors, and staff through team involvement in drills, preventative maintenance, & disaster preparation

Background:

The Estates at Roseville has been in need of a formally constructed safety committee to ensure the facility is in compliance with OSHA regulations, federal regulations, state rules, and the life safety & fire codes.

According to the MN Department of Health Nursing Home Rules, we must have a safety program that includes drills, security of the plant, a written safety & disaster plan, and in-service training programs.








Outcomes:

The survey above shows the pre- and post-data of staff confidence from education on emergencies that are most likely to occur at The Estates at Roseville.




The figure above shows the scheduled drill and tabletop experiences prior to safety committee (September-February) & after safety committee (March-August)

Facility Audit Document:

As a part of our Safety Committee, a structured audit was created. Every month, as a part of the Safety Committee meeting, the maintenance director, chairperson, and a volunteer member walk the facility to complete a Hazard Surveillance Report.

Summary of Success:

After implementing the program, the collected data shows that staff have gained more knowledge and confidence in disaster preparation & preventative maintenance. They understand the steps & where to find resources and tools.



The above shows just a selection of relevant rules and regulations from federal and state resources that drove the focus of the program. As we continue to work the PDCA cycle, we will standardize our process in accordance with these rules. We have plans to incorporate partial evacuation into drills, a demonstration of using a fire extinguisher from the fire department, & a tornado drill this spring!

Recommendations:

- Monthly Safety Committee meetings
- Continuously updating drills and tabletops calendar
- Continuous updating of rules & regulations and Monarch Healthcare Management policies & procedures
- Standardize the process through the PDCA cycle

Conclusion:

The Estates at Roseville found success in the development of our safety committee, followed by education, scheduled audits, improvement plans, and the PDCA cycle. We plan to continue safety education, drills, and tabletop exercises along with our safety committee. Bryan Fisher, the maintenance director, will continue the program.
